

# MEET DR. CHARMAINE TROY

Charmaine Troy Ph.D. is a speaker, author, strategist, first-generation student advocate, and educator with practical experience and academic training in access, equity, and inclusion. Her expertise focuses on expanding access among underrepresented populations, specifically first-generation students, and student success across primary through post-graduate education. She currently leads Georgia Tech's work in supporting the co-curricular success of first-generation college students. Prior to joining Georgia Tech, she served as Assistant Dean for First-Generation Student Success at Virginia Tech.

Born and raised in the rural town of Lumberton, North Carolina, Dr. Troy is a first-generation college graduate. She has served as a legislative intern at the North Carolina General Assembly where she worked with representatives and their constituents in areas of education, mental health, and juvenile justice. In 2011, she was selected by the U.S. Department of State and the U.S. Embassy to participate in an international exchange program between Armenia and Turkey in an effort to promote grassroots civic engagement in education. Dr. Troy previously served as an advisory board member on the Gwinnett County Public Schools Community-Based Mentoring Program in Georgia. She also served as Vice Chairman of the Wake County Housing Authority Commission in North Carolina and Director of the Wake County Housing Finance Corporation (nonprofit). She was also the first African American to serve on the Board of Directors for the Montgomery County (VA) Economic Development Authority. Additionally, Dr. Troy is a founding member of the NASPA Black First-Gen Collective.

Dr. Troy earned a B.A. in Journalism and Mass Communication from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, a Master's in Public Administration from North Carolina Central University, and a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Higher Education from Morgan State University. #### PROVIDING SUPPORT TO FIRST-GENERATION COLLEGE STUDENTS THROUGH ADVOCACY AND PROGRAMMING

The transition from high school to college for first-generation college students can be filled with uncertainty and questions about the institutional resources available that will help them succeed. It is important for first-generation students to connect their transition and experiences in college to their majors through mentorship, programmatic opportunities, and campus resources. At Virginia Tech, the First-Generation Student Support program was launched in August 2019 to help first-generation students navigate this transition and to advance first-generation student success. The mission of First-Generation Student Support is to advance firstgeneration student success through partnerships that contribute to
